We experienced another year of growth and excitement at Southwest Virginia Community College during the 2021-2022 academic year. Classes, student activities, and community events resumed on campus, including our first in-person graduation ceremony since the pandemic started.

A new athletic facility came online with the completion of the new softball field. We anticipate will attract players and fans alike. In other construction news, our Foundation broke ground and started the student housing development construction - a first for any of Virginia's Community Colleges. Phase I of the development can support 96 students in two

buildings. We are excited to see how affordable housing near campus impacts student engagement and completion.

In addition to physical structures, we continue to build our academic and workforce programming. Investments in our arts initiatives include partnering with The Bristol Ballet and launching a new culinary arts program. The Ballet partnership allows our students to learn from a variety of experienced dancers. Students in the culinary program at our Lebanon Center are learning culinary skills, and getting real-world experience by catering local events with regionally-sourced ingredients. The Workforce

and Continuing Education
department launched a highlyanticipated Diesel Repair Mechanic
program at the Southern Gap
Transportation & Logistics Center in
Grundy. The program started at
maximum capacity and continues to
attract new students. Our Bluefield
Center is seeing growth by adding
Health Sciences classes as well as
Certified Nursing Assistant and
Phlebotomy certifications.



WHO WE ARE

The 1966 General Assembly of Virginia authorized the establishment of a statewide system of comprehensive community colleges and appointed a separate State Board to develop a Master Plan for a statewide system of community college education in Virginia. The Master Plan designated a community college to be established in the area serving the counties of Buchanan, Dickenson (partial), Russell, and Tazewell.

A delegation of local citizens met with State officials to determine the feasibility of immediate development of a community college for the region. A local College Board was appointed in the summer of 1967. The Local Board recommended that the college be named Southwest Virginia Community College and that Dr. Charles R. King be appointed as president.

The College opened to students in the fall of 1968 with an initial enrollment of 710 students. Fall 2021 credit enrolment was 2,864 unduplicated headcount students.

WHAT WE DO

Programs of study at Southwest include administration of justice, business, education, engineering and technology, general studies (transfer), industry and manufacturing, and science/health technologies. In addition to classes being offered at the college's main campus, we also provide instruction at off site locations including the Lebanon Center, Bluefield Center, Bluestone Center in Bluefield, Booth Center in Grundy, Southern Gap Transportation & Logistics Center in Grundy, as well as online classes.

In addition to credit based programs, the Southwest Virginia Community College Workforce and Continuing Education department offers fast-track training and industry recognized credentials. The Workforce and Continuing Education program also offers customized, cost effective training solutions for employers.

Newer additions at Southwest include the School of the Arts, an expanded Agriculture program, Honors College, 14 NJCAA sports teams, and 5 club sports. These programs are designed to benefit students and the community-at-large, with impacts going beyond the college's campus.







STUDENT ENGAGEMENT & INCLUSION

Students who are engaged, both in and out of the classroom, are the ones who demonstrate success time and time again. One way to promote student engagement is by building a community of inclusion, where everyone feels welcome and is given the opportunity to join in a variety of activities with their peers.

We are excited to have a new Coordinator for Student Engagement and Inclusion, Mr. Antwan VanBuren. Antwan comes to us from Emory & Henry College and brings a wealth of experience working with students as a basketball coach and student advisor.

LAPTOP LOANER PROGRAM

A laptop is a necessity for college, however, they are not an insignificant expense. Through funding from Title III, Southwest was able to lend out 142 laptops at no cost to

students. The laptops are preloaded with Windows and Office applications, making them ready for the first day of classes. At the end of each semester, students return the laptops which are wiped clean (all data is cleared and the device itself is disinfected). Students returning for another semester may renew their laptop checkout.

TIMELYCARE MENTAL TELEHEALTH

Southwest is excited to offer TimelyCare - a new telehealth program for students. The service provides access to 24/7 mental virtual health care from anywhere in the United States, with no cost to visit! Whether our students feel anxious or overwhelmed, they are able to talk to a licensed provider from their smartphone or any web-enabled device. Since the service became available in January 2022, 76 students have registered with the service and they have engaged in 36 visits.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT


The Southwest Food for Thought student food pantry is open to all students throughout the semester to grab a snack or quick meal before class. With nearly one-third of our students facing food insecurities, this service is needed more than ever.

NAMING OF THE ADVISING CENTER

Dr. Amanda Ellis-O'Quinn, psychology instructor at Southwest, unexpectedly passed away in the summer of 2020. Her impact and influence at Southwest was significant and could be seen in her work as well as the students and employees with whom she interacted. Over the years, Amanda had served as Coordinator of Recruitment and Student Activities, a member of the Foundation's Board of Directors, a teacher, and faculty advisor for the Student Government Association and Campus Crusade for Christ. In addition to a scholarship created in her name, a visible memorial to her and her service has also been erected. A dedication service was held to unveil the naming of the Dr. Amanda Ellis-O'Quinn Advising Center. Amanda's dedication to students was profound. Her name on the advising center will serve as a reminder to us all that we are here for the students.

UPWARD BOUND

Southwest celebrates the continuation of funding for three Upward Bound grants serving high school students in our region. These grants are awarded from the United States Department of Education and have been at Southwest for over 25 years. April Quesenberry, Upward Bound Director, writes a proposal for grant funding every five years. The amount awarded this year is \$982,988 for a total of \$4.9 million over the five year span.

The Buchanan County Upward Bound grant serves 64 students at Hurley, Grundy, and Twin Valley High Schools. The Appalachian Upward Bound grant serves 64 students at Castlewood, Council, Honaker and Lebanon High Schools. The Tazewell County Math and Science Upward Bound grant serves Graham, Tazewell and Richlands High Schools. New to the grant service region are Lebanon and Graham High Schools. Students in the program are given the skills and motivation necessary to enroll and persist in post-secondary education. There is also a STEM initiative where students have the opportunity to participate in the nationally recognized Upward Bound robotics team. The students served from these grants meet specific criteria laid out by the US Department of Education.

HONORS COLLEGE

The Honors College program is designed to challenge academically, well-prepared students and provide opportunities for academic excellence, in-depth subject exploration, research, service/leadership enhancement, and experiential learning on a local, national and global level. This year, 13 new honors students joined the program. The students read and discussed Martin Luther King Jr's book "Letter from a Birmingham Jail" and began 11 new research projects for the honors requirement. The students also attended the National College Honors Conference in Dallas, TX.

SOUTHWEST ROBOTICS TEAM SCORES BIG AT NATIONAL COMPETITION

This past June, the new Southwest Robotics Team travelled to Long Beach, California to compete in the 2022 MATE ROV Competition World Championship. This was an underwater robotics competition with their robot named SeaEagle. The team competed in the PIONEER class and members use their skills in research and development, finances, and media to run a mock business that aims to solve real-world problems. They placed first with their product demonstration; this is where the robot actually

RECRUITMENT ROADSHOWS PRODUCE RESULTS

Southwest has had tremendous success with taking recruitment efforts on-the-road. The recruitment team completed 17 roadshow events across the service area. During the most-recent tour, they met with 340 students which resulted in a total of 191 registrations for Summer and Fall.

FOR STUDENTS IN NON-TRADITIONAL PROGRAMS

Eighty-three (83) students have enrolled in non-traditional programs at Southwest Virginia Community College including 31 female students in Administration of Justice; one female in Automotive Diagnostic & Repair; 4 females in Electronics; 8 females in Engineering; one female in HVAC; 29 males in Nursing; and female students in Welding, Contractor's License and Commercial Driver's License programs. The Carl Perkins Career and Technical Education is a principle source of funding to strengthen and improve the quality of vocational education, more particularly nontraditional programs.





BLUEFIELD CENTER UPDATE

Our Bluefield Center continues to grow and has been adding staff, programs, student services, and hosting community events.

Currently the Bluefield Center offers classes in the Education, Health Sciences, and General Studies program pathways. Workforce offerings at the center include welding, certified nursing assistant (CNA), and phlebotomy. Bluefield is also a testing center for CNA. There are currently 28 full-time students enrolled at the center.

Staff at the center includes student services like advising, Veterans Upward Bound, and instructors. Denver Rife, Site Coordinator, and Andrea Laney, Administrative Assistant, work with others in the community to serve the Bluefield area in both Virginia and West Virginia.

In addition to academics and Workforce, the site hosts board meetings, events of local organizations, and coordinates with the Southwest Virginia Workforce Development Board to host job fairs.

Personal enrichment classes in the "Livin' in Southwest Virginia" series are also becoming popular among community members.




WORKFORCE & CONTINUING EDUCATION Diesel Repair Mechanic program at

Enrollment for all Workforce and Continuing Education students totaled 564, which is a 10% increase over the prior year. In addition to that, Southwest continues to see strong enrollment numbers for Fast Forward programming and served a total of 192 students with in-demand training. Comparing 2022 Fast Forward enrolment numbers with the inaugural year in 2017 shows a growth of 292%, which is the third highest growth rate among the 23 Virginia's Community Colleges.



PROGRAM EXPANSIONS

In June 2022, three new premier programs launched for the Workforce & Continuing Education division. Our highly anticipated Diesel Repair Mechanic program from the Southern Gap Transportation & Logistics Center began with

10 students, which was our maximum capacity. Upon successful completion, students will earn a total of 13 industry recognized credentials and be well prepared to enter the workforce. We have also seen very strong demand for both our CNA and

to expand both Workforce and academic training opportunities with the implementation of The Academy for Advanced Manufacturing and the Trades. This will provide better training opportunities to students wishing to enter a career in Welding, Advanced Manufacturing, Transportation

> and Logistics, Heavy Equipment Operator, and Diesel Repair Mechanic. This grant will also be targeted to allow students in K-12 settings to gain better exposure to a career within the Skilled Trades. We are also in the beginning

phases of establishing partnerships with local employers that would allow students

in targeted training cohorts to participate in paid externships. In addition to that, we are also working toward establishing a partnership with the Department of Corrections that would better allow us to provide training opportunities to residents at specific DOC facilities. These expanded and collaborative training opportunities will better allow individuals to reenter society and be prepared to gain meaningful employment upon their release.

EXPANDED TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES

We were awarded a Department of Labor WORC grant totaling \$1.3 million. The funds for this grant will be utilized



NEW EMPLOYEES AND EQUIPMENT

Southwest welcomed a new member to our team, Amanda Davis, who will serve as our Administrative Assistant and be a key point of contact for our division. We also purchased several new pieces of equipment to improve the overall quality of our training. We now have two state-of-the-art CAT simulators for our Heavy Equipment Operator program and have relocated this cohort to a new and improved training location on campus. In addition to that, we have purchased engine and brake training simulators for our Diesel Repair Mechanic program at Southern Gap Transportation & Logistics Center. With the addition of this new state-of-theart equipment, Southern Gap now stands as the only Diesel Repair college within a six-hour radius.






