We are currently engaged in reaffirmation with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, a process that emphasizes our accountability and commitment to excellence. At the same time, we are advancing a new strategic plan focused on student success, workforce alignment, and community partnerships—one that will guide our efforts in the coming years and ensure we remain responsive to local needs and statewide goals.

As I begin my tenure as president, I am honored to join a community defined by dedication and achievement. Amanda and I are grateful to call this community home, and I look forward to the year ahead as we build on this proud tradition and ensure that Southwest Virginia Community College remains a beacon of opportunity for our region.

Who We Are

The 1966 General Assembly of Virginia authorized the establishment of a statewide system of comprehensive community colleges and appointed a separate State Board to develop a Master Plan for a statewide system of community college education in Virginia. The Master Plan designated that a community college be established in the area serving Buchanan, Dickenson (partial), Russell, and Tazewell counties.

A delegation of local citizens met with state officials to determine the feasability of the immediate development of a community college for the region. A local College Board was appointed in the summer of 1967. This Board recommended naming the college Southwest Virginia Community College and appointing Dr. Charles R. King as its President.

The College officially opened to students in the fall of 1968 with an initial enrollment of 710 students. The fall 2024 credit enrollment headcount consisted of 2,391 students.

What We Do

Programs of study at Southwest Virginia Community College include criminal justice, business, education, engineering and technology, general studies (transfer), industry and manufacturing, and science/health technologies. In addition to classes offered at the college's main campus, we provide instruction at off-site locations, including the Lebanon Center, Bluefield Center, Bluestone Center in Bluefield, Booth Center in Grundy, and the Southern Gap Transportation and Logistics Center in Grundy, as well as online.

Furthermore, the Southwest Virginia Community College Workforce and Continuing Education department offers fast-track training and industry-recognized credentials. This department also provides customized, costeffective training solutions for employers.



Where We Work

Southwest Virginia Community College operates within a geographically diverse and economically vital region encompassing Buchanan, Dickenson (partial), Russell, and Tazewell counties.

The work of Southwest Virginia Community College is deeply integrated into the social and economic fabric of the region. Faculty, staff, and administrators engage in teaching, training, advising, and community outreach across a wide range of settings, from traditional classrooms and technical labs to remote learning environments and industry-specific training facilities.






Non-Traditional Careers








Gender Distribution

The National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD) recognizes individuals who have demonstrated an extraordinary commitment and contribution to their students and colleagues.



Presidential Changes

Southwest Virginia Community College began the 2025 fiscal year under the leadership of Dr. Tommy Wright, who had served as president with distinction. His tenure was marked by a commitment to student success, institutional growth, and regional collaboration. In October 2024, Dr. Wright was appointed Senior Vice Chancellor for Finance and Operations at the Virginia Community College System (VCCS), a role that allows him to apply his financial acumen and strategic leadership across the entire state system.

Following Dr. Wright's transition, Dr. Victoria Ratliff was named Interim President of Southwest Virginia Community College by Dr. David Doré, Chancellor of VCCS. Dr. Ratliff, a respected leader within the college, brought continuity and stability during a pivotal time. Under her guidance, the college maintained its momentum while a search committee was formed to identify the next permanent president, someone who could build on the college's strong foundation and lead it into the future.

On May 22, 2025, the college proudly announced that Dr. Clinton Hayes would become the fourth permanent president of Southwest Virginia Community College. Dr. Hayes officially began his tenure at the start of the 2025–2026 fiscal year, bringing with him a wealth of experience in higher education leadership, student engagement, and workforce development. His appointment marks a new chapter for the college, one focused on innovation, community partnerships, and expanding opportunities for students across the region.

Economic Impact




